We don't think anyone in Swale should have to face going hungry. That's why we provide three days' nutritionally balanced emergency food and support to local people who are referred to us in crisis. We are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.

Locations

Here are the opening times and locations for our foodbank centres.

Everyone who comes to the foodbank for emergency food needs to have a valid foodbank voucher.

They can help address your crises and provide support to maximise your income, help you navigate the benefits system, and identify any additional grants you could be entitled to. If needed, they'll issue you with a voucher so you can get an emergency food parcel from your local food bank.

We have 4 centres currently open – each centre runs at a different time and a different location.

Mark your property to deter burglars Property Marking

A determined burglar can be difficult to discourage. Good-quality doors, windows and locks are excellent deterrents, but there's even more you can do to stop burglars in their tracks.

Mark it

Make your valuables less attractive to thieves by using a property or police approved forensic marking solution only visible under Ultraviolet (UV) light. This can take the form of a special marker using ink or paint. Mark or etch your property with your postcode, house or flat number or the first three letters of your address. All of these measures help police identify stolen goods, making it harder for thieves to sell. So make your mark.

And property marking isn't only for things like electrical items and bikes, you can also mark high value belongings like antiques. However, we recommend that you seek specialist advice.

Register your property for free on **www.immobilise.com** – it helps the police identify the owners of recovered property. You can register anything that as a serial number with Immobilise.

Record it

Register your valuables using an accredited property database.

Take photographs and keep documents like receipts related to your property so you can prove ownership.

Register your bike

If you value your bike, then register it with **www.bikeregister.com**. The prominent stamp acts as a great deterrent.

Flag it it

If you value it, then mark it as protected. Window stickers and signage are extremely effective and are proven to be a powerful deterrent against burglary.

Newington History Group

Monthly talks: Our talks take a break this month, but we'll be back on Thursday, September 25 (7pm) when Melanie Gibson-Barton will talk about Elizabeth Barton, known as 'the Holy Maid of Kent', a nun and mystic who challenged the king.

It's an intriguing and compelling story that would grace any television drama being full of mystery, mysticism, miracles and, finally, treason. It tells of a Kentish servant girl who rose to influence the most powerful men in the country, including Henry VIII, Cardinal Wolsey and Thomas More.

On October 23, Carol Stewart will be looking across the centuries to detail the history of Kent's Caribbean community.

The talks are open to all (£4 at the door, members free) and are followed by free light refreshments and an opportunity for social chat.

Book gift: Last month Newington CEP School said farewell to 26 Year 6 pupils who will be starting at secondary school in September.

To mark the occasion, the history group presented each with a book, The History & Meaning of Newington Street & Place Names, by Thelma Dudley.

The history group regularly visits the school to talk to the children about the history and heritage of their village.

During last month's visit, children from all the classes were shown items of Roman pottery found in the village and were able to handle pieces. They also learned about the history of the school.

Dog Poo

Dog poo doesn't just look horrible, and it isn't just messy and a pain to clean up. It's dangerous. Every gram of dog poo contains 23 million bacteria, many of which can be passed on to humans – including campylobacteriosus, salmonellosis, toxocarisis (roundworms), coccidian, cysticerosis (tapeworms), E.coli, giardia and pario. The symptoms for many of these include fever, vomiting, diarrhoea and dehydration. As dog poo disintegrates, it also pollutes fresh water supplies, meaning it can affect the eco-system and could even end up in our drinking water. In fact, according to one source, dog poo is the number three cause of water pollution. Please clean up after your dog, think of our environment and use the bins provided.

Reporting Antisocial Behaviour

Does it feel like the situation could get heated or violent very soon? Is someone in immediate danger? Do you need support right away? If so, please call 999 now. Antisocial behaviour can have a lasting impact on neighbourhoods and communities as it often leads to an increase in crime, particularly violence and criminal damage. If you've witnessed antisocial behaviour of any kind, Call 101: for ASB, including drug dealing (if drug dealing is happening outside of a school or playground, call 999) Call 999 only in an emergency, if there is a crime occuring, someone is injured, being threatened or threat to life.

News from Citizens Advise Swale

How to spot parcel delivery scams

Parcel delivery scams are becoming increasingly common. They are known as phishing scams, and aim to trick you into giving away your personal information and financial details, so your bank account and money can be accessed.

One way scammers do this is by enticing people to click on links, which can lead to fake websites, in the hope that this information will be entered. This can be in the form of a text, or an email or phone call. There are also reports of fake 'Something For You' cards, which Royal Mail leave when a delivery is attempted, but no-one is home.

Here are some tips on how you can stay vigilant and spot the signs of a parcel delivery scam:

- If you're waiting for a parcel, and get a message that asks you to pay to get it, it's usually a scam. Don't click any links or attachments in the text or email. Delivery companies won't ask you to pay them through a link in an email or text.
- To check if a link is genuine, hover your mouse over the link without clicking on it, or press and hold on the link on a mobile device. You should be able to see the address the link goes to, and check it's the same as the company's official website address.
- Make sure you check the address carefully fake link addresses can look similar to the genuine address.
- Other signs of a message that is a scam include bad spelling and grammar, and when it starts with a general greeting instead of your name. But, scam messages can sometimes be sophisticated so don't rely on obvious mistakes only.
- If you get an email, check if the email address matches the sender's name or organisation you might have to click on their name to see the email address.
- If there's something you're unsure about, don't feel pressured to act. You can find the official details for the company the person who has contacted you says they're from, and ask the company if they've contacted you.

You can check if you think something might be a scam, using an online tool on the Citizens Advice website. If you have been scammed, you can report it on the Citizens Advice website, and check what else you need to do - including protecting yourself from further risks. Being targeted by a scammer or falling victim to a scam can make people feel anxious or embarrassed, but it's important to remember scammers are clever and scams can happen to anyone. Reporting them helps track down and stop scammers, and prevent other people from ending up in the same situation.

Rogue Traders/Bogus Tradesmen


Bogus tradesmen, door-to-door sales or doorstep fraud involves fraudsters trying to scam you after knocking at your door.

Legitimate doorstep selling involves someone selling you goods or services in your home or on your doorstep. Many honest businesses use this technique – but so do fraudsters.

Buying on your doorstep can be convenient. However, a salesman who uses clever tactics can pressurise you into buying something you actually don't want or something that's poor value for money.

Door-to-door frauds can take many forms, including:

- pressure selling
- unfair contracts
- overpriced or substandard home maintenance or improvements
- phoney consumer surveys
- bogus charity collections.



Bogus salespeople will provide false identity or contact information, making it impossible for you to identify or contact them. If you've paid them in advance, you won't get your money back.

Even if your bank or insurance policy covers any loss, you'll still have to contend with a damaged credit rating, continued correspondence over a prolonged period to repair the damage, and the emotional distress and anxiety identity theft can cause.

Also, be wary of opening your door to a potential burglar or someone who wants to get inside your property to enable other people to break in. Once they get through your door, fraudulent salespeople can take note of your valuables and any security measures you have in place.

The victims

Victims are often vulnerable, elderly and/or isolated people who know nothing of these scams and so are trusting of anyone who is friendly or seems knowledgeable and genuine. After they have become a victim, they often feel ashamed and/or scared and so don't tell anyone. This not only means the original scam goes unreported but it also makes it easy for the rogue trader to return for more. The stress of the victim's shame or fear may also go on to cause physical or mental health problems. And even if the traders are reported they are often untraceable as they will have given the victim false contact details or none at all.

Are you a victim of bogus tradesmen fraud?

- You've bought faulty, overpriced or substandard goods or services from someone knocking at your door.
- You've paid for these goods or services by credit or debit card.

What should you do if you've been a victim of bogus tradesmen fraud?

- Report it to Action Fraud.
- You can report the salesperson to the Citizens Advice on 0808 223 1133. or to the National Trading
- Standards if you believe they have sold you faulty, inferior or overpriced products or services. Similarly, you can seek advice from Citizens Advice about the terms and conditions of any agreement or contract you may have signed.
- If you've made the payment by credit/debit card or by cheque, contact your credit card company and/or bank and advise them that you're a victim of improper door-to-door sales techniques and your identity or financial details may have been compromised. They'll advise you on cancelling payments and ensuring your finances remain secure.

RECYCLING INFORMATION FOR RESIDENTS



What is contamination?

- It is placing non-recyclable materials or items into your blue recycling bin/clear sacks.
- It is placing items into your recycling bin/clear sacks which have not been emptied or rinsed well enough.
- Placing recycling in black sacks is also classed as contamination as we are unable to see the contents inside the bag. Placing recycling into the bin loosely is preferred, please do not use carrier bags or white sacks to dispose of your recycling in your blue bin.

Please help by following the 3 Simple Steps to getting your recycling right:

- STICK TO THE DRY RECYCLING LIST ONLY: Paper and cardboard, glass bottles and jars, metal food and drinks cans, foil, plastic bottles, tubs, pots and trays
- MAKE SURE ALL RECYCLING IS CLEAN BEFORE IT GOES INTO YOUR RECYCLING BIN/CLEAR SACKS: You do not need to use clean water for this. Once you have finished washing up, just give the recycling a quick rinse before putting it in your blue bin or pop it in your dishwasher!
- DO NOT PUT ANY OF THE TOP 4 CONTAMINATES IN YOUR RECYCLING BIN/CLEAR SACKS
 - 1. Nappies/Sanitary Items
 - 2. Textiles/Electrical Items
 - 3. Black sacks (we cannot empty bins where recycling is in black sacks)
 - 4. Food/Unclean containers

Employment Scams linked to TikTok

In the past week, we have seen employment scams linked to Tik Tok.

Often originating on social media and disguised as remote work or content roles, these fraudulent schemes disproportionately target young job seekers, with many cases seen by the bank involving those aged 18 to 34.

Scammers entice victims with fake job offers involving simple online tasks, such as liking TikTok videos or reviewing hotels, promising lucrative commissions and high returns from the comfort of their own homes. Hello! This is TikTok HR. We'd like to invite you to be our online employee. With just a mobile phone and working in your spare time, you can earn 300-800 daily. Leave a message now and get a 8 bonus. Plesae contact us for details. WA: http://www.me/

However, upfront fees known as 'advanced fees' are demanded for purported necessities like application processing, training, background checks or visa sponsorship.

Once payments are made, perpetrators typically cease communication, leaving victims blocked.

Some scams involve crypto wallets or platforms for task completion and some victims are even manipulated into forwarding money or acting as intermediaries, unwittingly laundering money, known as money muling. Money mules can find themselves at risk of a criminal record.

Here are some tips from Lloyds Banks on avoiding job scams -

- Be cautious of unsolicited adverts or job offers promising easy money, especially on social media, which is a key "hunting ground" for fraudsters. If you spot one, report it to Action Fraud.
- Remember legitimate companies will not ask you to make payments when applying for a job, nor would they ask you use your own bank account to transfer their money. Do not do it under any circumstances.
- Verify recruiters and companies independently, conduct your own research and do not rely on links and documents they provide.
- Avoid opportunities where you are added to unknown apps or group chats that claim to be part of the process.

Courier Fraud

In the past few weeks, we have seen an increase of reports from victims in relation to Courier Fraud. One victim lost £77,000 and another £16,000.

Residents have been getting phone calls from criminals mostly impersonating Police Officers and some claiming to be from their bank.

- One resident was told to "dial the long number on their card without clearing the line" and spoke to who they thought was their bank.
- Another was told their bank card had been used at Sainsbury's and to call 999 but without clearing their line.
- A few were told their bank cards had been copied/cloned.
- One was told by their bank to "withdraw money to get a new card."
- Another was told to stop using his bank card and go to the bank to withdraw the money for them to collect to help with an investigation.
- The Police will NEVER ask you for financial details on the phone or request to collect your card or cash or gold as part of an investigation. Remember the ABC of Scam Awareness and Never Assume or Believe a call is genuine and always Confirm.



If you get an expected call from someone claiming to be Police or any other organisation, then take their details and end the call. Then call back using a different phone if available. If another phone is not available, then wait 5 minutes and ring a family member or friend to ensure the line has been disconnected and then ring 101. Never call a number they have supplied and never ring 999 whilst still on the call with them. You must always disconnect the call first before ringing 101.

Facebook Hacks

A resident in West Malling was targeted by a Facebook hacked account scam.

A Facebook friend had their account hacked and the hacker contacted their friends, sending them

emergency messages saying they were in distress and needed money urgently.

This was a SCAM.

If you receive any requests for financial assistance from accounts such as Facebook, WhatsApp etc. Never Assume or Believe the request is genuine but Confirm by contact the person requesting assistance via a trusted number.

Fake Parking Fine messages

Whilst attending events, people have been stating that they are still receiving fake messages for parking fines and so I would like to take this opportunity to remind you to be alert to these types of scam.

What Do These Parking Fine Scam Texts Look Like?



Scam texts may claim you have received a Parking Charge Notice (PCN) or Penalty Charge for a parking offence. They will often:

- Include urgent language, e.g. "Final warning!" or "Your credit score will be affected."
- Contain a link to a fake payment page.
- Pretend to come from an official source. like your local council or DVLA (they do not send fines by text).
- Use company names that sound legitimate.

What to Do if You Receive a Scam Message:

- Do not click any links.
- Do not rely to the message.
- Do not share personal or payment details.

If you are genuinely unsure whether a fine is real, contact the council or company direct using details on their official website - Never the contact information in the message.
